Then there is the cost of the social problems that go hand-in glove with legalized gambling.

Gambling proponents don't like to talk about them, but I assure you they are there.

Consider this:

- The average pathological gambler affects, directly or indirectly, eight other people, including family, friends, and co-workers. Onethird of gambling addicts have been arrested, compared to only 5% of non-gamblers.
- Gambling addiction seriously affects absenteeism and job productivity. More than 20% of problem gamblers in treatment have lost a job because of their gambling.
- Gambling addicts are four times more likely to have poor menta! health and are four times more likely to attempt suicide than those without gambling problems.
- If legalizing gambling raised the percent of gamblers in our state to the national average. 15,000 additional gambling addicts would be created, at a cost of more than 200 million per year in crime, lost productivity and costs for health and human services.
- I agree with people who want to attract new jobs to their communities and who want to find new revenue sources for our state government. But you won't find the answer in legalized gambling.
